Summary of My Stay Abroad In conclusion, my Erasmus+ exchange at the University of Warsaw was an incredibly enriching experience, both academically and personally. Living in Warsaw allowed me to immerse myself in Polish culture, improve my language skills, and build international friendships. Academically, I appreciated the different teaching styles and course offerings, which broadened my perspective in my field of study. Beyond the classroom, I explored Poland's history, traveled to other cities (i.e., Gdańsk), and participated in university events, which deepened my understanding of the country. While there were initial challenges—such as adapting to a new academic system or navigating bureaucracy—however, the experience strengthened my independence and problem-solving skills. Overall, the exchange exceeded my expectations. I return to RUB University with newfound confidence, intercultural competence, and memories that will positively influence my academic and professional future.

Describe your greatest experience/achievement

Greatest Experience/Achievement During My Stay Abroad One of my most memorable achievements during my Erasmus+ exchange was strengthing my understanding of Humanitarian Action. Academic: Excelling in multiple courses actually, where I collaborated with other international students on projects about (Project Cycle Management, Protection of Civillains in Armed Conflicts, Confllits in Eastern Europe, Prevention of Mass atrocities, etc). Presenting our work to a diverse audience improved my confidence and cross-cultural communication skills. Personal: Overcoming the language barrier by learning basic Polish and connecting with locals—this made everyday life smoother and enriched my understanding of Polish culture. This experience pushed me out of my comfort zone and proved that I could thrive in an unfamiliar environment. The sense of accomplishment—and the friendships I made along the way—made it the highlight of my time abroad.

Describe your most negative experience

While my Erasmus+ experience was overwhelmingly positive, I did face some administrative difficulties, primarily related to bureaucratic processes and a lack of coordination between institutions. 1- Complex and Unclear Procedures Tasks like course registration, or legalization of stay for exchange students often involved excessive paperwork, unclear instructions, or delayed responses from administrative offices. 2- Lack of Centralized Support Information about deadlines, finding accommodation. Example: it took lots of efforts to find accommodation in Warsaw, some landlords refused renting their apartments, and others refused to rent for less than one year. At the end, I had to rent expensive apartment which affected my budget significantly. Impact on My Experience While I adapted, these hurdles consumed time and energy that could have been spent on academic/cultural immersion.

What was the biggest difficulty you faced while abroad?

The most significant challenge I encountered during my Erasmus+ semester was navigating the bureaucratic processes at both institutional and national levels. Key Issues: Dual Administrative Systems: Coordinating requirements between my home university (RUB), Brightspace (NOHA), and host university (University of Warsaw) often led to confusion, particularly regarding course approvals, credit transfers, and document deadlines. RLegalization of my stay in Poland as an exchange student: The Polish visa/residence permit process involved unexpectedly complex paperwork, with last-minute requests for additional documents (e.g., notarized translations, proof of funds in specific formats). Delayed Communication: Critical information about registration steps or policy changes sometimes arrived late, leaving little time to react. How I Adapted: Became highly proactive in seeking clarifications (e.g., scheduling in-person office visits when emails went unanswered). Built a support network with fellow Erasmus students to share solutions. Developed strong organizational systems to track deadlines and documents.

What would you have liked to know before your stay abroad?

Reflecting on my experience, below are the key things that would have better prepared me for my stay in Warsaw: 1- Administrative & Practical Challenges Visa/Residence Permit Complexity: I underestimated how time-consuming and detail-oriented the Polish residence permit process would be (e.g., needing apostilled documents, specific bank statement formats). A step-by-step guide from past Frasmus students would have helped. 2- Academic & Social. Adjustments Grading System Variations: Polish grading scales and expectations for participation differed from what I was used to. A pre-semester workshop on academic culture would have eased the transition. Erasmus Network Importance: I didn't realize how much social integration would depend on selfinitiative. Joining Erasmus Student Network (ESN) events early on would have helped me build connections faster. 3. Personal Preparedness Budgeting for Hidden Costs: Prices for groceries, transport, and travel within Poland were reasonable, but I didn't account for expenses like winter clothing or visa fees. A realistic budget template would have been useful. Cultural Nuances: Small things—like store closures on Sundays. A cultural "cheat sheet" from former students would have been invaluable. Suggestions for Future Students Request a Mentor: Pairing with a previous Erasmus student at the host university for practical advice. Pre-Departure Checklist: Official guides often omit "unofficial" tips (e.g., which banks are foreigner-friendly, best Polish language apps).
